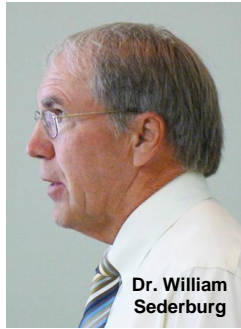
Speakers Addressed Education, Governorship, Larry H Miller, & Music

Dr. William R. Sederburg, Utah Commissioner of Ed. on July 8 reinforced to SLCH Kiwanians the correlation between education and income and the contribution to local businesses. There are 68,000 new Utah students but no extra budget for this coming school year. Utah ranks high in academic quality yet many problems persist such as fewer women who go on to college after high school. Major gaps also include helping low-income students, and having fewer school dropouts.

Hill Kiwanians ate heartily and enjoyed visiting and getting better acquainted with each other and their spouses or other family. All delighted in the fun and sharing of common service.



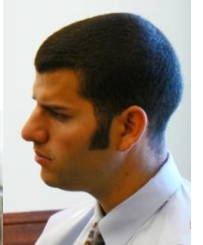
